

Title: Universal Design for Learning.

Universal Design for Learning (UDL) is planning your course so it is accessible to everyone.

Your course is made up of these components: content activities, assessments. You should provide multiple ways for students to engage with each component.

- Content: videos, readings, powerpoints, images, text, music.
- Activities: written, graphical, verbal, group, solo, in-class, at-home.
- Assessments: quizzes, exams, papers, proposals, art, music, written, verbal.

How do I use UDL?

- Prioritize student **experiences**.
- Consider **barriers** to learning and eliminate them.
- Give your students **options** for how to learn, practice skills, and demonstrate mastery.
- Make instructions, expectations, and goals **clear**.
- Explain the **hidden curriculum**.
- Promote **metacognition** (students thinking about their thinking).

Why should I use UDL? By using UDL, you are making students who are disabled or just prefer learning differently to learn without having to ask for accommodations.

**You are implicitly telling them you value them.**
